To the Huon Valley Council,

I write to request Council's support for the Leprena Trust proposed Blackswan Lagoon Scenic Protection Area, and inclusion under Local Provisions Schedule C8.0 Scenic Protection Area.

We will be encouraging the Tasmanian State Government to also support this proposal through an endorsement from the Tasmanian Parks and Wildlife Service. The Leprena Trust has informed us that that all private landholders within the proposed Blackswan Lagoon Scenic Protection Area are supportive of the proposal as drafted.

We request that Planning Commission directs the local planning authority, under section 35K(1)(a) of Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993 (the Act), to modify the Huon Valley Council draft Local Provisions Schedules in accordance with Leprena Trusts Blackswan Lagoon Scenic Protection Area request and enable readvertising and exhibition.

This area is of outstanding historical significance to Tasmania, Australia and France, as it marks the location of the first landing place of French explorers in 1792-93 and friendly encounters with local populations.

The area also held central European scientific endeavour (astronomical

observatories, and scientific collections of animals and plants in 1792-93, including the first

type specimen for Eucalyptus) and enterprise (bay whaling and convict coal mining during

the early 1800's).

Furthermore, the site holds native wildlife features of acute scenic integrity level,

including sea-eagle nests, major local breeding areas and threatened vegetation

communities, making its protection of paramount importance.
