My Name is Richard C Andrews home owner of 107 Stony Rise Road, Stony Rise.

I am deeply concerned about proposed development of 133 Middle Road, Miandetta, as I'm a ratepayer and concerned resident of this city of Devonport I'm horrified to find out about the need to destroy more native vegetation within our community again.

I am a regular walker within and surrounding areas between Stony Rise, Devonfield Kelcey Tier Greenbelt and Don reserve walking tracks, As I walk I'm always listening to the native birds and often taking photos of my surroundings but was recently shocked to see the recent destruction of native bushland and habitat that I know and loved next to Harvey Norman homemakers site I couldn't believe what I was witnessing the outright destruction and carnage of this amazing piece of essential bushland and valuable ecosystem of this area, This place had magnificent stringy barks and large tee-tree stands and thousands of frogs that they say we actually need in our environment as its essential isn't it but there habitat was destroyed completely.

As I'm a shift worker I was often out walking in the evening or nights and early hours of the morning before work and I often hear the sounds and see the presents of the native inhabitants and resident tawny frogmouth & Southern boobook owls and possums and eastern barred bandicoots paddy melons and potoroos adjacent to the Harvey Norman homemakers site along with millions of frogs.

I'm very much aware that the proposed development site mentioned above also contains the same highly valuable environmental fauna such as marsupials and birdlife and blue winged parrots that are often seen in daylight hours near the sub-station and on the lands of Devonfield that have the bush as protection fly back to safety of the trees nearby and is also the home of the magnificent tawny frogmouth & Southern boobook owls and again more frogs as you hear them especially at night if you chose to listen while walking passed.

As I traverse between the last remaining bushlands all linked to the beautiful Kelcey Tier green belt and the bushland between the houses of Stony Rise road and surrounds we must not destroy any more of this valuable resource that the wildlife see no borders or boundaries but fly and traverse between the sanctuaries for safety and acquiring food to survive.

Let me make this clear I am not against developments but I am when it comes to the unnecessary damage of our natural bushland environmental ecosystems.

Is this development science based? If not there has to be a better solution for the community.

Please value the natural beauty and environment and protect it as we progress our city and expand into the future in the most sensible way without the loss of anymore of the natural environment.

I strongly recommend that the council reconsider this proposal as we live in a world with natural habitat destruction never seen before in history, let's be the council to appreciate what we have left and protect this land for future generations to come and see bushland as essential to a strong and healthy society for the long term benefit of everyone and take pride in our environment, Let's find better solutions to dealing with natural growth of the city and finding sensible alternatives to development our community without the need for disappearance of anymore bush.
