Macquarie Point Multipurpose Stadium - Project of State Significance Integrated assessment process

The Tasmanian Planning Commission (the Commission) is required to undertake an integrated assessment of the Macquarie Point Multipurpose Stadium, which has been declared a project of State significance.

Under section 21 of the *State Policies and Projects Act 1993* (the Act), the Commission must within 14 days of the commencement of the assessment give to each 'agency'¹ which the Commission considers has an interest in the project notice. Thereafter, such agency has 28 days (or such longer period as the Commission may allow) to make submissions to the Commission setting out the agency's views in relation to the project.

In addition the Commission must, under section 22 of the Act, prepare a draft integrated assessment report in consultation with each such agency (and the Hobart City Council). The draft has to be placed on public exhibition and advertised.

Please note that the Commission has not yet commenced the integrated assessment. It will commence when the Macquarie Point Development Corporation has provided to the Commission all the reports relied on by the Corporation.

The Commission has determined the Department of Premier and Cabinet to be a relevant agency with an interest in the Macquarie Point multipurpose stadium on account of Aboriginal Heritage Tasmania being part of the Department. A number of others have also been determined to be an 'agency'.

This letter is to advise at an early stage how the integrated assessment process for the project will include the Department of Premier and Cabinet and to provide forewarning to allow the Department to plan for their involvement.

In due course the formal notice under section 21(1) of the Act will be given. Accompanying will be the reports from the Macquarie Point Development Corporation.

¹ As defined in section 3 of the Act.

As noted, the Commission is required to consult with the Department of Premier and Cabinet in the preparation of a draft integrated assessment report. To that end, the Commission will hold meetings with the agencies as required, including to explore matters raised in their submissions.

The Commission will establish procedures and communication protocols to apply at the meetings to ensure there is transparency in the scope and outcomes of these meetings.

A flowchart providing further details of the integrated assessment process is attached.



	The Commission prepares its draft integrated assessment report (IAR) and publicly exhibits it, along with any submissions received.
	Representations may be submitted by any person during the exhibition period. The Commission must consider representations.
	The Commission may hold hearings in relation to representations. The Corporation will be invited to participate in any hearings.
al IAR and recommendation	
	Following the process above, the Commission may modify the draft IAR.
	The Commission submits a report to Minister with a recommendation on whether or not the project should proceed, and if so on what conditions.
